As the multiplicity of the data implies, the methodologies used also vary widely from corpus-linguistic methods to analysis of paratexts, and from crosslinguistic analysis of source and target texts to contextualization of target texts in their respective target cultures. The target cultures and languages dealt with in the articles include Catalan, Chinese, Czech, Dutch, English, Finnish, French, German, Italian, Russian and Spanish. Hannu Kemppanen and Pekka Kujamki are professors in Foreign Languages and Translation Studies at the University of Eastern Finland, Joensuu. Leena Kolehmainen and Esa Penttil work as post-doctoral research fellows at the same department.
