They and a host of others tell lively stories about McMurtry's writing of the epic novel and the process of turning it into the miniseries *Lonesome Dove*. Accompanying their recollections are photographs of iconic props, costumes, set designs, and shooting scripts. Rounding out the book are continuity Polaroids used during filming and photographs taken on the set by Bill Wittliff, which place you behind the scenes in the middle of the action. Designed as a companion for *A Book of Photographs from Lonesome Dove*, Wittliff's magnificent fine art volume, *A Book on the Making of Lonesome Dove* is a must-have for every fan of this American epic.

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
